On or before May II, 2021, Conestoga patrons will be asked to vote on the proposed improvements at the Elementary Building & Jr. Sr. High Building. If your primary residence is within the Conestoga School district, you are eligible to vote on the proposal. The Cass County Election Commissioner will be sending voter ballots in the mail to your household.

The chart shows the total amount of tax levy for each school year. The history of Conestoga's finances are influenced by past building bonds, legislation, State Aid, & educational needs. This current 2020-21 year; the district did not levy for bonds. All building bonds are paid off, which has lowered the total levy, if compared to previous years. The proposed bond levy, using this year's 2020 taxable valuation amount, would be 18.25 cents. The future total levies are approximate amounts using our current budgeting practice of \$ .95 for the General Fund levy and adding the 18.25 cents. The estimated \$1.13 total levy for future years are comparable to past taxes levied by the district.

#### THE PROPOSED BOND AMOUNT IS \$33.610.000 FOR A 25 YEAR BOND TERM.



With the projected future levy increase of \$0.1825 per \$100 of property valuation for the bond and a \$0.1344 per \$100 of property valuation reduction in the building fund, there will only be a \$0.0481 total increase in the school levy.


#### WHAT IS A SCHOOL DISTRICT LEVY

The school districts use taxes to balance its budget along with Federal and State funding. The amount of the levy is determined by the needs of the school. The largest part of the levy is called the General Fund; which pays for all staff salaries and benefits, curriculum materials, building/utilities/maintenance, and all other monthly bills. A Special Buildings Fund can also be collected to grow a building renovation & improvement project, like a roof replacement. The Bond Fund levies or collects funds to pay off a bond note. Adding the 3 funds together creates the total levy that the school district uses to maintain the educational environment and needs of the students.

Reflections of past levy averages reveal that the last 10 year's average of \$1.1595 is considerably lower than the 30 year's average of \$1.3014. The Board of Education works to ensure an outstanding education for the kids of Conestoga and also stewards the funding of levies wisely. The proposed Building Bond Fund and the General Fund total levy is estimated to be \$1.1325. The Board of Education may also consider adding a few cents for the Special Building Fund to buildup funds for future repairs and maintenance. This could bring the total levy to be near the 10-year average

Conestoga offers home based early intervention services to children and their families who reside in the school district. Children are referred to the district for testing through their pediatrician or by contacting the district for an evaluation. The child is then evaluated in the area of concern and it is determined if they meet eligibility requirements for early intervention special education services. If a child meets the requirements, the services available may include physical therapy, occupational therapy, speech language therapy and early childhood special education services. # Conestoga Preschool

Conestoga offers FREE preschool to children residing within Conestoga School District. Children are eligible for 2 years of preschool if they attend both age eligible years. Children must turn 3 by July 31st of the current school year, for their first year of eligibility and must not be kindergarten age. If a child turns 5 by July 31st of the upcoming school year they are not able to attend Conestoga preschool. Priority when placing students in preschool is given to children who have special needs or are 4-years-old by July 31st.

# STUDENT SERVICES

#### DIRECTOR OF STUDENT SERVICES. MRS. WRIGHT

Every school district in Nebraska is required to participate in a monitoring process with the Nebraska Department of Education to ensure compliance with State and Federal Special Education guidelines. During the 2021-2022 school year, Conestoga will be participating in this process.

Monitoring priority areas that the State will be reviewing include;

- I) Provision of a free appropriate public education in the in the least restrictive environment including compliance with the requirements of the Individualized Education Plan (IEP);
- 2) Procedural Safeguards for parents;
- 3) General supervision including: Child Find, which is the evaluation and identification of children and youth with disabilities and Transition for students 18-21, who based on their IEP, are identified as needing functional and vocational skill instruction; and
- 4) Disproportionate representation of racial and ethnic groups in special education and related services, to the extent the representation is the result of inappropriate identification.

After the State has reviewed these areas as well as completes a file review and a review of special education policies and procedures, the State will issue a finding of compliance. If we are found to be out of compliance in an area, we will develop a corrective action plan to remedy any concerns that were found.

# END OF THE YEAR REMINDERS

Your cooperation and diligence in following the COVID guidelines helped ensure we were able to stay in school learning and participating in school activities this 2020-2021 school year. That being said, some of our requirements for returning to school in the fall will look a little more "normal" this year. Well child checks, physicals, and immunizations will be necessary and audited as they were in years past.

Well Child Checks Physicals and Immunizations

- All students entering Kindergarten are REQUIRED to be up to date on immunizations and need to have physicals within 6 months of starting school.
- Yearly well child checks are strongly encouraged for all students.
- Every student athlete is REQUIRED to have a current up to date sports physical on file at school. Sports physicals are required each year for students that participate in athletics. Physicals that are not up to date for the 2021-2022 school year will not be accepted.
- Students entering 7th grade in the 2021-2022 school year are required to have a Tdap booster and physical
- ALL students entering 9th grade are required to have a physical.

#### Medications

• If you have a student that takes medications at school, or have brought any medications into school. Please arrange for them to be picked up by a parent or guardian at the end of the school year. Medications will NOT be sent home with students NO EXCEPTIONS. Any meds left over after the last day of school will be disposed of and will not be kept over for the following school year.

# **CURRICULUM CORNER**

## DIRECTOR OF CURRICULUM, INSTRUCTION, AND ASSESSMENT, MRS. BERGMEYER

I would like to thank the community for participating in some recent surveys from the Nebraska Department of Education which focused on the strengths and areas of growth for our schools. The next few newsletters will focus on questions and discussion based off the surveys. This newsletter will focus on sharing the grading systems at Conestoga.

## Percentage Based (traditional A,B,C,D,F):

- Percentage based grading is currently utilized by 5th grade through 12th grade
- Traditional grading system that averages a student's whole learning over a set amount of time.
- Through this system a GPA is able to be determined and gives us a set number to determine grade level learning throughout the quarter
- · Final grade given at the end of each quarter

## Standards Referenced Grading:

- Also heard standards based grading is utilized by grades Kindergarten through 4th grade.
- Allows teachers, students, and families to view how the student is progressing through the year
- Determines mastery of a specific standard instead of an average of their learning.
- What does a "P" mean on your child's paper? You could consider this the equivalent of seeing an "A" on a traditional paper.
- A benefit of standards grading to your child is that if your child did not score well on their first few assignments, as they were just learning the
  content, it will not be reflected in their final score.
- Proficient means they truly are proficient with the standard at that moment in time

#### Why two different systems?

The elementary has been transitioning to this system for quite some time. The standards referenced system allows teachers within a grade level to drill down to identifying specific areas in which to teach students. This system allows students to be grouped and instructed by areas of similar need. It also allows students the opportunity to quickly review a concept if needed before beginning a lesson or even skip a concept due to their performance. Both systems have their benefits and purpose.



In addition to basic functional academics, students in Life Skills spend time throughout the day learning valuable life skills such as laundry, and basic cooking, as well as performing jobs both in the classroom and around the school building. This year, they got to take the skills they've learned, and put them to use in real life work experiences. Two of our students have been attending a work-based learning experience at No Frills in Plattsmouth on Tuesday's and Thursday's. The rest of the class has been going to Lake Ridge Golf Course and working around the restaurant, lounge, and clubhouse. Our goal is to continue to seek out and provide opportunities for real work experiences within our community; and we hope to be able to partner with many more businesses in the coming years!

Coming up on April 28, we will be participating in the Special Olympics track meet hosted by Ashland-Greenwood. Students in Life Skills will be competing against 10 other schools in 8 different events. So far there are over 80 kids registered to participate! Each student in the Life Skills class is allowed to take one partner from their regular ed classes, which means we will have 16 students in the Special Olympics this year! Student life - Does the school offer activities you will enjoy? If you plan to live on campus, do you like the housing arrangements? Will you have an opportunity to work on or near campus?

Make your final decision by May I and then notify the colleges you're rejecting so they can offer your spot, and financial aid, to another student.

The digital nature also allowed alumni from Chicago, Colorado, and Kansas to judge throughout the season, allowing Coach Schlichtemeier to serve as tech support for competitors when needed. We were fortunate enough by the beginning of February to pick up a handful of in-person meets. Transitioning from a Zoom audience to a real live audience was a challenge in and of itself. The team rose to every challenge thrown at them and were able to have a successful season despite the setbacks. 
