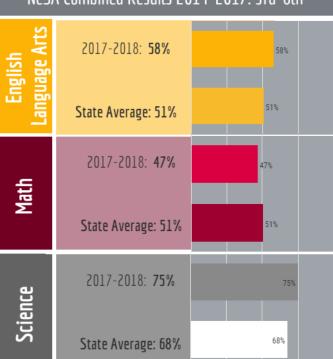

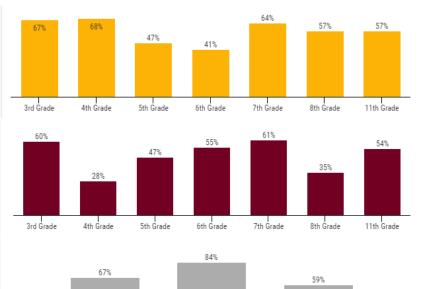




NeSA Combined Results 2014-2017: 3rd-8th

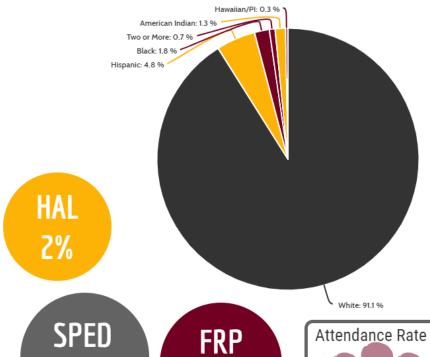


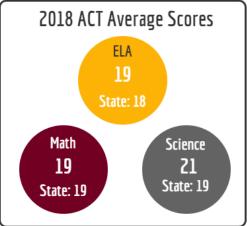
NSCAS Grade Level Results 2018 % Proficient: 3rd-11th (ACT)



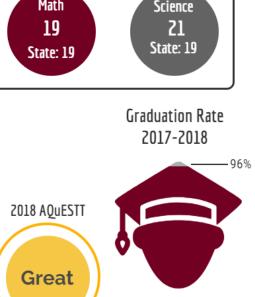


Student Demographics

CONESTOGA PUBLIC SCHOOLS

The Conestoga School District (#56) comprises approximately 198 square miles in Cass and Otoe Counties. The district is made up of the communities of Nehawka, Murray, Beaver Lake, Lake WaConDa (partial), and the surrounding rural areas. The district is organized as a PreK-12 educational program with the PreK-6 Building located in Murray and the 7-12 building located 2.5 miles west of Murray on Highway #1.

Conestoga is classified as a Class III (PreK-12) district by the Nebraska Department of Education and a Class C1 school by the Nebraska School Activities Association. AdvancEd, which serves an 18-state region of schools and colleges, has recognized the elementary and secondary programs for meeting high quality educational standards and has accredited all grade levels. Conestoga is a member of the East Central Nebraska Conference. Member schools include Auburn, East Butler, Elmwood-Murdock, Johnson County Central, Louisville, Malcolm, Mead, Palmyra, Weeping Water, Yutan, and Freeman.

The Conestoga School District is governed by a six-member board of education. The Board meets at the elementary building in Murray the second Tuesday of the month. The meetings start at 7:00 PM, unless otherwise advertised. The 2018- 2019 members of the Board of Education are: President Scott Moore, Vice-President Dean Nickels, Secretary David Duzik, Treasurer Tracey Priefert, and members Jason Nolting and Allison Welch.

The Conestoga Public Schools Educational Foundation is a non-profit organization that operates separately, but as an extension of the schools. The Conestoga Board of Education serves as the Foundation Trustees. The Foundation was formed for acceptance of tax-deductible donations from interested supporters of education. Since the formation of the Foundation in 1989, donations of cash and equipment have been provided as memorials and contributions. Each year the Foundation awards scholarships to graduating seniors from the Conestoga Schools to further their education.

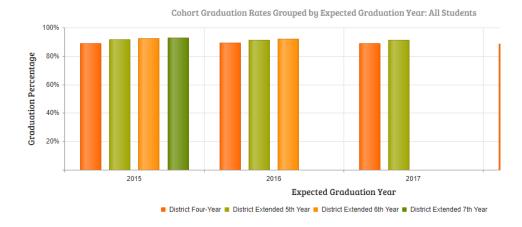

Improvement Goals

Provided by the school district for 2017-2018

Conestoga Elementary

Goal 1 - Math

Increase math problem solving scores by 10%, which will be measured three times per year by using MAP test and/or AIMSweb.

Goal 2 - Reading Comprehension

Increase comprehension scores by 10% to the "at or above grade level," which will be measured three times per year using AIMSweb or MAP test.

Goal 3 - Reading Fluency

Increase fluency scores by 10%, which will be measured three times per year using AIMSweb or StoryTown.

Goal 4 - Behavior

After a baseline is established with teacher checklists and SWISS, students will decrease time spent out of the classroom due to disruptive behavior, by the end of the school year.

Conestoga Jr. - Sr. High School

Goal 1 - Reading

Each year, 15% of junior high (7th & 8th grade) students will increase their MAP test Reading RIT scores at least four points based on Fall to Spring Assessments.

Goal 2 - Math

Each year, 15% of senior high $(9 - 12^{th} \text{ grade})$ students will increase their Math MAP RIT scores by at least four points based on Fall to Spring Assessments.

Goal 3 - Student Involvement

School involvement in activities, sports and groups will increase to 90% of students enrolled.



Special Education Services

Special education services are specially designed instruction, at no cost to the parent, to meet the unique needs of a child with a verified disability. School districts must ensure that all children with verified disabilities, from birth to age 21, have available to them a free appropriate public education which includes special education and related services to meet their unique needs.

The *Students in Special Education* report displays the percent of students, ages 5-21 as of October 1st, who are receiving special education services divided by the number of all students K-12 as reported in Fall membership.

Part B School Age

The report titled *Special Education – Part B School Age* includes students with a verified disability, ages 6 to 21.

Part B Preschool

The report titled *Special Education – Part B Preschool* includes children with a verified disability, ages 3 to 5.

Part C Infant/Toddler

The report titled *Special Education — Infant / Toddler* includes infants and toddlers with a verified disability, age's birth to 3.

Early intervention services means developmental services that:

- Are provided under public supervision
- Are selected in collaboration with parents
- Are provided at no cost (except in some unique situations)
- Are designed to meet the developmental needs of an infant or toddler with a disability and the needs of the family to appropriately assist in the infant or toddlers development. As identified by the Individualized Family Service Plan (IFSP) Team, in any one or more of the following areas, including; physical development, cognitive development, communication development social or emotional development or adaptive development.

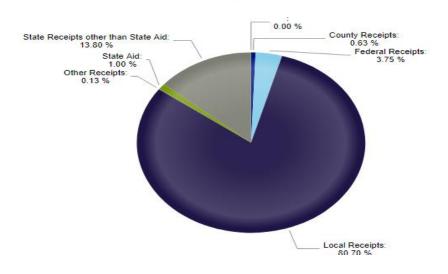

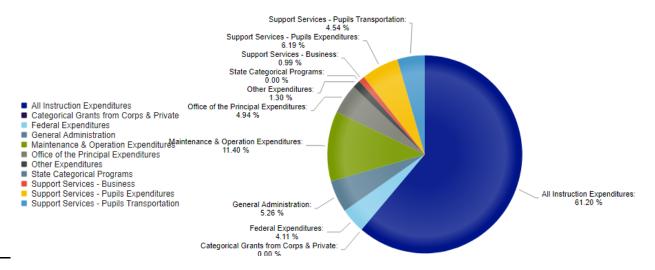
Financial Receipts for school year: 2016-2017

Technology is Essential For Learning

- Each K-2 grade level has a cart of 25 mini IPads for the students to use. Total number of student mini IPads is 75.
- The elementary library has 25 mini IPads.
- All 3 6 grade students have IPad's for regular class instruction, which are kept at school.
- Elementary teachers received Apple MacBook Airs and IPad Airs.
- Jr. Sr. High windows computer labs are housed in the Library Media Center (32), Business Lab (18).
 The Media Lab 19 iMacs.
- Grades 7 12 incorporated the 1 to 1 Technology Initiative. All students in grades 7 10 receive an IPad for use during the school year. All students in grades 11 - 12 receive an Apple MacBook.
- Jr. Sr. High teachers receive Apple MacBooks and iPads.

MTSS (Multi-tiered System of Supports) is the practice of providing high-quality instruction to the students based on their individual needs. Progress is monitored frequently and used to guide the decision making process for any change to instruction and goals.

Universal Screening is used to screen and monitor student progress to ensure the necessary skills are learned to become a successful reader. Journey's reading program was implemented in grades K-6 in August 2016.
